My love for this church began when I read of its history on the church web-site. From that moment, I cared passionately about the church's future. The compassion for serving the poor homeless, the commitment to civil rights regardless of creed, class, color, or sexual orientation, and the conviction that the church can and must make a difference in the world are all things that I admired about our church.

It is well and good to be proud of our history but we run the risk of denigrating that history to the level of "nostalgia" if we fail to let it motivate us to continue the trajectory of being an inclusive congregation that is not afraid to stand for justice and peace no matter how unpopular or costly that stand might be.

When I was first asked to consider applying to be the minister at Pulaski Heights, I was not looking for a new ministry. Nonetheless, I was quickly intrigued with the idea. I was worried about the size of the church, and the enormous task of re-building that lay before it. I grew up in a very large Disciple congregation and my 2 previous calls were to congregations with Sunday worship attendance that were 5 and 6 times our attendance so I wasn't sure if I would know how to proceed in helping Pulaski.

However, I could see that the church had a strong foundation and that it would be a shame to let that foundation lay bare without any effort to build upon it. More importantly, I am convinced that God has a mission for our church. We still have a witness to share and many people for which to care. The Spirit is alive and well among us!

It seems to me that the world is becoming an increasingly hostile place for the poor, the disadvantaged, and the most vulnerable of our society. Pulaski Heights has always had a big heart for serving God's people—especially those that society shuns. As we approach our 90th birthday, I pray that we will continue to have that big heart as we walk with Jesus and serve as he served.

1964-1965 Approved Budget

This year is Pulaski Heights Christian's 90th birthday year. On October 7, 2017, we will conclude that year and start on our 91st. Meanwhile, let's look back at some historical highlights that have been boxed away for years. For August: those small-dollar old-timey church budgets! We found one of them preserved in a historical archive box.

Several years ago, a dollar bought more. The 1964 buying power of those dollars was at issue when the congregation considered and approved the coming 12 months' church budget on May 24 of that year.

PROPOSED 1964-65 CHURCH BUDGET FOR FULLSKI HEIGHTS CHRISTIAN CHURCH (adopted by the congregation at a duly called meeting on Sunday, May 24, 1964)

"THIS CHURCH...HAS NO PURPOSE BUT TO SERVE"

Acts 1:8 - "But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria and to the end of the earth."

1964 Paraphrase - But you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be my witnesses in Little Rock and in all Arkensas and the United States and to the end of the carth.

The dollar amounts are smaller than we see in the 2018 budget, but the internet allows us to convert amounts due to inflation. From the website usinflationcalculator.com we get "If in 1964 I purchased an item for \$21,300.00, then in 2017 that same item would cost \$168,307.79. Cumulative rate of inflation: 690.2%."

General Assembly elects Teresa Hord Owens as first African-American woman to head mainline denomination



INDIANAPOLIS – Rev. Teresa "Terri" Hord Owens was elected on July 9th to serve as the General Minister and President of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in the United States and Canada. She is the first African-American to hold this post and the second woman to lead the denomination.

Hord Owens comes to the position in a time of renewed emphasis on the issues of race, particularly in the United States. Her election comes on the 50th anniversary of the Merger Agreement uniting the African-American and largely white branches of the American-born denomination. She is currently pastor of a predominately white congregation in the Chicago area.

"We need to stop demonizing differences as deficiencies," Hord Owens says. "We should seek to understand, to work through our differences in priorities, opinions, methods, and goals. This will not be easy, but imagine what an example this will be for the world if we can bridge the gaps in politics, identity, geography and theology."

Hord Owens' resume includes more than 20 years in corporate America leading diverse teams in data management before she entered seminary. For the last 15 years, she has been the dean of students at the University of Chicago Divinity School, shepherding a varied student body in both background and theology.

The election of Hord Owens follows the 12-year tenure of the Rev. Sharon E. Watkins, who was the first female to lead a mainline denomination in the United States upon her election in 2005. Hord Owens' term is six years with an option for re-election in 2023 for an additional six-year term.
