

Christmas Is Approaching

Today is December 1st. Yes, I'm behind. I just got through walking my dogs in shorts and a t-shirt (me, not the dogs). The day we put up our Christmas tree it was 77 degrees! Let me be clear, I am not complaining except that it probably all has to do with global warming and that is not good. But, that is an article for another day.

It just makes me realize that my sense of "Christmas is approaching" is tied to the weather and the changes outside. I guess I better not move to the southern hemisphere!

How about you? Does it feel like Christmas is approaching? Are we ever really ready for Christmas? I'm thinking: always and never. We are always ready because we always need the message and hope of Christmas. We may feel like we are never ready because the expectations that surround Christmas can be pretty daunting.

Whenever I feel overwhelmed by those expectations, I remind myself that the first Christmas came without any of the fanfare of our modern Christmas celebration. No feast. No relatives, but plenty of strange strangers (those shepherds and Magi). No decorations or lights other than perhaps a lamp or stable torch. Not even a home. But that first Christmas had everything that the world needed for every Christmas and every day ever to come. It had the gift of Emmanuel, God with us.

Jesus was born into a messy world. To a poor people. In a turbulent political time. In a barn. To a backwater nation occupied by the dominant world power of the day.

Why didn't God wait for a more advantageous time? Why not wait until Israel was restored to her former glory? Why didn't God choose a more central location? Why not Rome, the center of civilization? Why didn't God choose players that would be more credible? A young woman pregnant before the end of the betrothal? A peasant man with a simple trade?

Why? Because it was Kairos time meaning the decisive or opportune moment. It was the fullness of time as Paul describes it. Simply put, it was God's chosen time. It was the right time and ever since, time has been infused with the fullness of his grace and presence.

Today, as much as ever we need to embrace the gift

of his presence in our lives and in our world. Today, as much as ever we need his hope and peace. We need, like the Shepherds to be lit with joy as we listen to angel song. We need, like the Shepherds to run and find him. We need, like the wise men, to put all aside in order to seek him. We need, like the wise men to have the courage to defy evil in order to protect him. We need, like Mary and Joseph to say "Yes" to him and allow him to change our lives. We need, like Mary to sing his praises and ponder in our hearts all that his advent means.

As we wait to celebrate his birth, our world is still in a mess. Greed runs rampant and fuels violence. Division builds walls of mistrust to keep us from listening to one another. Bigotry paints lop sided pictures of every social challenge. Blame finds scape goats with ease. And so we pray, "Come, Lord Jesus, Come." Be born in us and bring us contentment. Be born in us and tear down our division. Be born in us and give us eyes to see one another as you see us. Be born in us and ignite our passion for peace.

May we all use this advent season to prepare our hearts and minds to receive God's gift of Emmanuel, Jesus, our Savior.
